## Unruly Waters: A Political and Cultural History of the Monsoon

This lecture delves into the political and cultural importance of the monsoon in India since the late nineteenth century. It examines how changing meteorological knowledge was absorbed into political discussions about India's future. In the early twentieth century, many among India's engineers, planners, economists, and political leaders committed themselves to infrastructural solutions to the vagaries of the monsoon; over the long term, these infrastructures have had a number of unintended consequences. The range of policy options on the table today, in response to India's many water-related challenges, are a residue of that earlier history.



## Sunil Amrith

Sunil Amrith is the Renu and Anand Dhawan Professor of History at Yale University, and Chair of its South Asian Studies Council. He is the author of four books, including Crossing the Bay of Bengal (2013) and Unruly Waters (2018); Amrith is a 2017 MacArthur Fellow, and received the Infosys Prize in Humanities in 2016.
